Now read the following guidelines carefully before answering questions.

GUIDELINES FOR TMAs

You will find it useful to keep the following points in mind:

1. **Planning:** Read the questions carefully. Go through the units on which they are based. Make some points regarding each question and then rearrange these in a logical order. And please write the answers in your own words. Do not reproduce passages from the units.
2. **Organization:** Be a little more selective and analytic before drawing up a rough outline of your answer. In an essay-type question, give adequate attention to your introduction and conclusion. The introduction must offer your brief interpretation of the question and how you propose to develop it. The conclusion must summarize your response to the question. In the course of your answer, you may like to make references to other texts or critics as this will add some depth to your analysis.

Make sure that your answer:

- (a) is logical and coherent;
 - (b) has clear connections between sentences and paragraphs;
 - (c) is written correctly giving adequate consideration to your expression, style and presentation;
 - (e) does not exceed the number of words indicated in your question.
3. **Presentation:** Once you are satisfied with your answers, you can write down the final version for submission, writing each answer neatly and underlining the points you wish to emphasize.

You may be aware that **you need to submit your assignments before you can appear for the Term End Exams. Please remember to keep a copy of your completed assignment, just in case the one you submitted is lost in transit.**

Answer any five questions. All questions carry equal marks.

1. Discuss Donne's unconventional themes related to metaphysical conceits, paradoxes, and exploration of complex emotions in his love poems. **20**
2. How does Edmund Spenser showcase the theme of national identity in his poetry particularly in The Epithalamion and The Prothalamion? **20**
3. Analyze how Wordsworth uses nature to explore themes of growth, self-discovery, and the influence of the natural world on human experiences as he delineates in 'The Prelude Book I'. Supply suitable examples in support of your answer. **20**
4. Compare and contrast the poetic styles of P.B. Shelley and Keats in dealing with themes of mortality and nature. **20**
5. Explain the narrative structure and thematic significance of T.S. Eliot's 'The Waste Land'. **20**
6. Discuss the portrayal of love and faith in Andrew Marvell's poems with reference to specific examples from the learning material of the course. **20**
7. Investigate how Plath's poetic voice and confessional style are shaped by the larger modernist movements in literature. Discuss her engagement with themes of mental illness, gender dynamics, and personal struggles in the context of the mid-20th century literary landscape. **(20)**
